When my daughter told me that she could not see, I thought she was pretending and reprimanded her asking her whether she did not realize the desperate condition of true blind people. Nelius lost her sight suddenly due to what doctors said was "intracranial pressure". It is only when we went to the hospital and the doctor gave the grim diagnosis on her sight that I realized she was not faking. Words cannot express the shock and hopelessness I felt. I nearly lost my will to live. But God is great because he gave me strength.



When I look at my daughter now, I still feel a pang of pain and regret at what could have been. She had been good at math and used to talk of working in the bank. However, all that is in the past and I have accepted the situation and the new possibilities. Nelius has been a real joy to us as a daughter, and she has a heart of gold.
